

From solid member to Local President, from 5 minutes to a life's work – your participation at any level makes the Union stronger

- Locate and read your contract Increase your knowledge of your rights and how they are enforced.
- Read your union's notices –
   e-mails, newsletters, meeting notices
   better information means better decisions.
- Check the Union websitefor updated information on Union issues, actions and events.
- Nominate trusted people to serve you and co-workers as union officers, delegates, bargaining team.
- Vote in union elections good union governance depends on strong officers and negotiators.
- Attend your Local meetings get up to date information and have a voice in critical Union decisions.
- Express concerns on workplace issues – introduce yourself to your Steward and tell them what's up.
- Participate in Union surveys a few minutes investment means the Union can better reflect your views.
- Wear an AFSCME pin or t shirt make it visible that you strongly support the Union's issues, efforts and campaigns.
- Register to vote registering means you'll have a voice if the next election involves Union rights, issues, candidates.
- Cast your ballot make sure what you've won in the workplace and contract isn't lost or weakened in the election process.
- Take pictures at Union events –
  you preserve the Union's history, and the
  Union's website pops with member pictures.

- Attend a Union social event or volunteer to help. Getting to know fellow members strengthens unity – and it's fun.
- Keep up the Union bulletin board current newsletters, steward/officer contact info, meeting schedules, union issues.
- Step up on workplace issues –
   Schedule doesn't work? Safety an issue?
   Offer to work on them with your Steward.
- Attend a rally, carry a sign you'll increase the clout - for your own Local's bargaining or another union's struggle.
- Serve on a committee whether

   Union by-laws or elections committee or
   one at work, you'll help members, and learn!
- Talk to your church or community about the importance of your (and coworkers') work and union efforts.
- Work on a union/community project you'll help the community group and help your Local build critical community alliances.
- Write a letter, make a call when a critical vote loom on a bill that affects jobs and members, nothing beats personal contact.
- Work a phone bank shift –
   or walk a precinct for a ballot issue
   or candidate important to the Union.
- Become a Steward members need help in protecting and enforcing their rights; as Steward you'd be on the job to help them.
- Run for a delegate position –
   delegates serve the Local's interests at
   bodies like the Labor Council and Council 57
- Serve as a Local officer serving as an officer or board member can help your Local face challenges beyond the workplace level.
